

Each person called up for an aliyah recites the following:

Ba·r'chu et A·do·nai ham·vo·rach!

בְּרַכּוּ אֶת יְיָ הַמְּבַרְכֵךְ !

to which the congregation responds:

Ba·ruch A·do·nai ham·vo·rach
l'o·lam va·ed!

בְּרוּךְ יְיָ הַמְּבַרְכֵךְ
לְעוֹלָם וָעֶד !

The person repeats the above phrase and then continues with either one of the following two b'rachot:

Ba·ruch At·tah A·do·nai
E·lo·héi·nu mé·lech ha·o·lam,
a·sher bá·ch·ar bá·nu mi·kol ha·a·mim,
v'ná·tan lá·nu et To·ra·to.
Ba·ruch At·tah A·do·nai, no·tein ha·To·rah.

בְּרוּךְ אַתָּה יְיָ
אֱלֹהֵינוּ מֶלֶךְ הָעוֹלָם,
אֲשֶׁר בָּחַר בְּנוּ מִכָּל הָעַמִּים,
וְנָתַן לָנוּ אֶת תּוֹרָתוֹ.
בְּרוּךְ אַתָּה יְיָ, נוֹתֵן הַתּוֹרָה.

Each person called up for an aliyah recites the following:

^{1,2} Bless Adonai, source of all blessings.

to which the congregation responds:

We bless Adonai, source of all blessings,
at every moment, now and forever.

The person repeats the above and then continues:

³We bless You, Adonai our God,
ruler of the universe,
who chose us among all peoples
by giving us Your Torah.
We bless You Adonai, giver of Torah.
